Javier Gonzalez is the Project Manager of Sound Strike, a coalition of artists that have come together in an economic boycott of Arizona in the wake of the passage of SB1070. Javier has previously worked as a community, labor and political organizer. As the founder and Executive Director of SOL, Javier raised millions of dollars to get out low-income Latinos to vote and registered over 110,000 new voters. For years, Javier has been active in the fight for immigrant justice and in the Los Angeles Area Chicano cultural scene.

Ken Grossinger is the Chairman of the CrossCurrents Foundation (CCF), a non-profit foundation promoting social and economic justice. Prior to his philanthropic work, Grossinger worked in the labor movement for more than 20 years, initially at SEIU and then directing Legislative Field Operations for the AFL-CIO. Grossinger is a commissioner on the Washington, DC Housing Authority Board of Commissioners and serves on several boards, including the Alliance for Justice, State Voices and the New School Vera List Center for Art and Politics.

Lani Guinier, Lawyer, Scholar, Civil Rights Activist

Lani Guinier has been a law professor for over 20 years. Before that, she was a litigator with the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, Inc. At LDF, her docket focused on voting rights litigation and legislation.

Lori Hanau's work is guiding and supporting individuals on their paths toward the artistry that comes through increased consciousness and in living in greater connection with self, community and the Mystery. She works similarly with organizations, groups and networks as a community builder and facilitator, supporting the emergence of healthier, more meaningful collaborations and developing high performance teams.

Previously, he co-founded VideoTheVote.org, a nationwide network of citizen journalists that monitor election irregularities, and has aided the growth of ColorOfChange.org, the largest online constituency representing the concerns of Black America and GetEQUAL.org, an organizing project calling for LGBTQ equality. Ian also directed and edited the 2006 Sundance award-winning documentary American Blackout, chronicling voter suppression.

A long-time studio executive, independent producer and social change agent, Liz Manne was recently appointed Executive Director of FilmAid International, a humanitarian organization that harnesses the power of film to educate and bring hope to refugees and other communities in need around the globe. Under his leadership, Voto Latino hired and trained a robust field team that registered over 10,421 new voters in a record-breaking four weeks. Eddy now serves as Voto Latino's Deputy overseeing the organization's strategy and its day-to day operations. Prior to joining Voto Latino, he served as the Electoral Field Manager for the Center for Community Change. He was charged with managing its \$3 million campaign for voter registration. Eddy has also consulted NCLR and managed the organization's Community Based Organization affiliate outreach for new citizens.

Amy Morris, Program Officer, Surdna Foundation

Amy Morris is a Program Officer for Foundation Initiatives at the Surdna Foundation where she focuses on research and development and cross-programmatic collaboration. She worked with Presente.org as an online organizer and is currently a consultant to the END (Education not Deportation) Project for the United We Dream network. She recently wrote two children's books. She plays the viola and aspires to be a musical therapist.

Anne Pasternak, President and Artistic Director, Creative Time

Anne Pasternak's goal has been to present some of the most adventurous and historically important art in the public realm. Under her leadership, Creative Time's programming has extended nationally and internationally from the historic Brooklyn Bridge Anchorage, Grant Central Station, Governor's Island, The Highline and Coney Island to New Orleans, Haiti, Lagos, and beyond. In addition to her work at Creative Time, Pasternak occasionally curates independent exhibitions, consults on urban planning initiatives, and contributes essays to cultural publications. She lectures extensively throughout the United States and Europe, and she served as a guest critic at Yale University.

Erin Potts, Executive Director, Air Traffic Control

In her early 20s, Erin Potts created the Tibetan Freedom Concerts with the Beastie Boys that produced international awareness, mobilized hundreds of popular musicians, raised over \$5 million, and turned tens of thousands of young people into activists for Tibet. Her work with culture makers melds music and activism into increasingly compelling, creative, and effective engagement strategies.

Toshi Reagon, Singer, Songwriter and Musician

Toshi Reagon is a talented, versatile singer, songwriter and musician with a profound ear for sonic Americana—from folk to funk, from blues to rock. While her expansive career has landed her comfortably in residence at Carnegie Hall, the Paris Opera House and Madison Square Garden, you can just as easily find Toshi turning out at a music festival, intimate venue or local club. Toshi has been the recipient of a NYFA award for Music Composition. She co-composed music for two Peabody award-winning films and won The Black Lily Music and Film Festival Award for Outstanding Performance. She is a National Women's History Month Honoree and is the 2010 recipient of OutMusic's Heritage Award.

Damon Rich, Designer and Artist

Damon Rich is a designer and artist. His work represented the United States at the 2008 Venice Architecture Biennale, and has been exhibited at PS 1 Contemporary Art Center, Storefront for Art and Architecture, SculptureCenter, the Canadian Centre for Architecture, and the Netherlands Architecture Institute.

Alex Rivera, Digital Media Artist and Filmmaker

A recognized expert on how popular culture impacts American attitudes and values, he has served as a thought leader, widely sought-out speaker and strategist on utilizing media to shift public opinion concerning progressive and civil rights issues. In 2010, Robinson was selected as one of “The Root 100,” a list of emerging and influential African Americans. He has previously held leadership roles at GLAAD, the Right to Vote Campaign, and FairVote.

Favianna Rodriguez, Visual Artist

Favianna Rodriguez is a visionary artist on a mission: To create profound and lasting change in the world. She is renowned for her cultural media projects dealing with social issues such as war, immigration, and globalization, as well as for her leadership in establishing innovative institutions that engage new audiences in the arts.

Raymond Leon Roker is a seasoned media producer of progressive culture via print, images, events and video. His 20-year career started with co-founding the pioneering URB magazine. Philip Sanchez is currently the Manager of Philanthropic Initiatives for Time Warner Inc.
